# Looking for God in the neighborhood

At the end of September the participants in the diocesan Learning Communities Initiative met together to reflect on our activities since the initial training session in March. It is amazing to me how much has been learned and accomplished since that time. We practiced listening to under-

stand, rather than to respond. Observing our neighborhood as it is, rather than assuming that what we already know is correct. Experimenting with connecting to our neighborhood — the context where we are to be the Church. And sharing with others what we were learning along the way. The process has been remarkable in a number of ways. We have discovered that 110 Oswego Street is quite a lively property much of the time! Neighbors, students, dog-walkers, skateboarders, joggers, parents and others constantly pass through our driveway, parking lot and back yard. The area surrounding the church is also busier than one might expect, including the school paths, the mall at Smokey Hollow Road and the adjacent neighborhood. Our parish LCI group decided that setting up the Prayer Mailbox would be a good learning experiment, and was pleased by the enthusiastic cooperation and interest shown by other parishioners including those who offered to pray privately for requestors, and those who offered to put forth requestor's concerns from the congregation during the Prayers of the People.

Also surprising was the convergence of some other efforts, including Parish Life's ice cream social and Community Band concert, the Grace in Community group's efforts with new and refurbished signage, and the gracious response to using Dwelling in the Word reflection at the Sunday sermon time. Other parishes participating in the LCI reported similar experiences. Not everything works as expected, especially on the first try, and that is okay. There will always be bumps along the way, and the important thing is to keep listening, keep experimenting, and above all keep looking for God at work in our church and community.

### September 11 special meeting

• Vestry voted to revise parish administrator position budget to not exceed \$15,650. This is calculated based on 876 hours annually with possible additional 100 hours as necessary.

- Our Finance Committee continues to investigate ways of increasing better rates for our finances.
- The Stewardship Committee will be meeting to review and plan the 2019 Campaign.
- The 2019 Snowplowing agreement has been approved.

### **BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS SERVICE**

Our fall collection culminates with a Blessing of the Animals, 4 p.m., Sunday, October 6 in the Memorial Garden. You can bring in your pets, or pictures of them, for a blessing, followed by treats for pets and their humans.



### Outreach "Pet Project"

HumaneCNY is an animal shelter located in Liverpool, which seeks to better our community through kindness to animals.

Their mission: To provide our community with an animal shelter that shows compassion and respect for life by following a no-kill philosophy and by striving to provide the cats and dogs entrusted to their care with permanent, loving homes. They have been the advocate and caretaker of homeless cats and dogs since 1966.

HumaneCNY is now back into their newly renovated building at 4915 Taft Road. While the shelter was being renovated, they adopted out nearly 500 animals from their small temporary shelter. Now that the renovation is complete, they hope to adopt out many more animals than ever before. But they need our help with their "Stock the Shelter" campaign. This year during the month of September, Outreach is again asking parishioners to bring in any of the following:

- · Laundry detergent
- Dish soap
- · Bleach and cleaning supplies
- · Baby wipes
- Cat food, wet or dry



- 1) Bake them in **mini-loaf foil pans** (approx. 6" x 3.5" x 2").

### OF OUR CHURCHES

Do you remember where you were, and what your reaction was, when you first learned that the great cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris was



burning? I was out and about when the news first lit up my smartphone; my reaction was utter, stunned disbelief — this just had to be a hoax. It was not.

I have never been to Paris myself, but truly, Notre Dame in Paris is not just a French cathedral, but a gift to people all over the world; it is etched into many of our memories through Victor Hugo's magnificent novel *Notre Dame of Paris*, popularized in English as *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*. In Victor Hugo's novel, the cathedral itself is at the center of the story, not Quasimodo. If you want to get a sense of Victor Hugo's tale, skip the modern animated movie, and go for the 1939 movie featuring the great Charles Laughton as the titular character. Or better yet, go to your local bookstore, and pick up a printed copy. This grand story, with its themes of fate, family, and (in-) justice in the 15th century Christian era, sets the foundation for many later authors, including Charles Dickens.

Why should we react so deeply to this magnificent building having been severely damaged by fire? For one, it's not just any old church—it has stood for centuries, watching over the lives of thousands of people like you and me; it has seen wars, revolutions, defeats and victories; it has seen pain, suffering, redemption and joy. The great cathedral embodies human history as much as it watched over it. For a second, churches are dear to us as the House of the Lord, to which we are glad to go!

Just as Notre Dame de Paris was and is being kept alive by those who visit, pray and worship in it, so our own churches are kept alive by us, who visit, pray, worship, work and volunteer in them, and reach out to our communities from them.

As fall approaches, our church leadership will ask us to consider in prayer and action our own commitment to a life in Christ and as members of our church. I'm asking you to respond with grace and generosity. We do not know whether our churches will stand in a few hundred years, or who will worship our God in them; but we do know that it is up to us, living our lives as followers of Christ, and standing on the shoulders of those who came before us, to in turn enable those coming after us to stand on our shoulders as they carry on proclaiming the Good News. Let us do so!

# Help Wanted — Parish Administrator, Part Time

Grace Church seeks a part-time parish administrator for approximately 18 hrs/week Sept-Jun and 12 hrs/week Jul-Aug. Office hours are negotiable, but envisioned as a 4-day work week. The Parish Administrator works with the Rector to manage the administrative responsibilities of the parish, including communications, volunteers, facilities, records and assist with routine finances. The parish administrator will often be the first point of contact for visitors and members, and must display an attitude of welcoming hospitality ad pastoral sensitivity.

Skills required include:

- Strong and professional communication skills.
- Effective collaboration and pastoral style.
- Strong integrity, honesty and confidentiality.
- Ability to take initiative and make decisions under pressure of deadlines.
- Ability to work with those with diverse personalities and differing opinions.
- Working knowledge of Microsoft Office suite (Word, Excel, Publisher)
- Knowledge of, or ability to learn ACS Realm (church management software), Rite Stuff, Google G Suite applications, WordPress, Safe Church training administration, and other software applications as necessary.
- Ability to operate and maintain office equipment (computers, copier) and oversee maintenance and maintenance contracts.
- Knowledge of Episcopal Church polity and liturgy or previous Episcopal Church office experience a plus.

This position may occasionally require additional time due to workload (e. g., holidays, funerals).
