Mother Cathy's Corner

It's been a month and a half – it seems like forever.

It's been a month and a half – it seems like yesterday.



The two statements above only *sound* contradictory. They are both true at the same time. We have not been gathering in person for 44 days as I write this. Yet we can see and hear each other, worship, share virtual coffee hour and meetings and conversations several times per week, just as we always have done. Despite having to do it differently, in ways that are unfamiliar, that may be awkward and not like our traditional ways, we are worshipping, meeting, keeping in touch, praying, grieving, celebrating, helping others and being the community that is Church. Not perhaps in the ways we would have chosen, but in the ways that are possible.

In some curious and new ways, we are following in the steps of Jesus' disciples. They also were living with incredible disruption to the way things were. Their friend and rabbi had been arrested and crucified and raised from the dead. He had appeared to them, with the marks of crucifixion still showing, but very much alive, talking and eating and appearing to others. And the disciples rejoiced. But now what? How would this movement have to change? How many things would be different and perhaps unfamiliar and uncomfortable? As St. Luke tells in in the gospel and the Book of Acts, they continued to pray together, to meet together, and to do those things Jesus had taught them. And, I'm sure they pondered and discussed what the future would look like. After fifty days, as they were all together, and just as Jesus had promised, they were given the Holy Spirit at Pentecost*.

And then things got *really* different. And the disciples were really different people too. They had a *mission*, given to them by Jesus. They were equipped with habits of prayer, with proof that God's promises can be trusted, and the assurance that, no matter what, Jesus would be with them. This confidence showed in their preaching and teaching and healing. For example, Peter, who was, after all, a fisherman, and not a great public speaker, preached so eloquently that 3000 were baptized the same day. How could he be so changed in just 50 days? How could they all become so focused on mission that nothing could stand in the way? In just 50 days?

Although we will probably not gather together for some time yet, what new things might we take from this time? What have you discovered that you can do – that you *never* thought you would? And how have you been aware of Jesus' presence with you in this sojourn?

Online Worship and Formation Opportunities

There are numerous opportunities for worship and formation on the internet provided by churches throughout the diocese and beyond. A few parishioners have confidentially mentioned to me that when it comes to celebrating Sunday morning church services online it's, "just not my cup of tea." In our household my wife and I are split on the matter. She diligently gets up early each Sunday morning and dutifully watches mass live-streamed on Facebook. Sitting in her makeshift office in the basement, she even "sits" and "stands" when directed. I've joined her a few times, but quite honestly, sometimes I find it depressing... it just makes me miss being in church. Still, it works for her.



If you are like my wife, and are enjoying the "worship from home" experience then you are in luck, There are so many opportunities to worship, both in real time, and pre-recorded, at Grace church and across the diocese and beyond.

But, if you find yourself struggling with the "worship part," of the online church experience as I do, then the "formation part," might be just what the digital doctor ordered.

Here at Grace, Mother Cathy's forums are informal and perfectly suited to the informal nature of the internet. We all can stand to learn more about the Bible, and Mother Cathy knows her stuff! One of the rewarding aspects of my job in the office at Grace are the theological and biblical conversations I get to have with Mother Cathy. There have been numerous occasions when Mother Cathy has shared with me some element of the coming Sunday's Gospel reading. Carrying the knowledge from those conversations to church with me has helped make that weeks readings so much more meaningful. And, I get to sound like a know-it-all when I tell my wife things like, "did you know the reason Peter's syntax sounds odd in this Gospel is because some scholars speculate the words might be direct quotes of his?"

While we are all stuck in our homes and lamenting the fact that there won't be a New York State Fair this year, we might as well do something productive and take the opportunity to grow in faith through the various online worship and formation opportunities that Grace Church and others have to offer.

MAY VESTRY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- Pledges continue to be received allowing us to keep our operating bills paid. Thanks to all parishioners for their continued support.
- Due to the current social distancing recommendations and that practice continuing in the near future, the Vestry felt it best to postpone the Chicken BBQ to a later date for the safety of our parishioners and the Baldwinsville community.
- It was decided to apply for assistance through the CARES Act and its' Payroll Protection Program which is part of the federal economic stimulus bill. It offers forgivable loans to small businesses, including non-profits, for maintaining payroll and paying qualified expenses.
- The Church Pension Fund has also offered to wave the obligation for clergy pension plan assessments for up to two months. The parish does not have to pay this money back at a later time and the clergy will receive full credit for the length of the waiver. Brad Pettit is overseeing this application process.
- With regard to our church insurance coverage, we have received notice from Church Insurance that they will be extending payments for 90 days beyond the effective/due date before cancellation.
