


Mother Cathy's Corner

Almost fifty years ago a musical theatre production based on parables from St. Matthew's gospel premiered off-off-Broadway. Begun as a project by drama students at Carnegie Mellon University the show was eventually rescored for an off-Broadway production, which became a long-running success. The show is, of course, *Godspell*.

Recently I read that the current Massachusetts Berkshire Theater Group's production is now the first Equity-sanctioned musical performing during the pandemic, described as "a brilliantly staged, socially distant model of the future of theater that has all eyes in the entertainment world watching, and audiences heading to sit under a tent in Pittsfield, MA".

But this is not the same show as the 1971 production, nor the same as the 1973 film adaptation (which, if you remember, featured the cast dancing atop the then brand-new World Trade



Center in New York City). It is not the same as the almost ten thousand other productions worldwide, either. Our context is different. Some of the hallmarks of the show, like the constantly-in-motion cast, and the upbeat feel, are dialed back to accommodate a production safe for cast and audience. And some of the lighthearted humor is also dialed back, so cast members can express the loss and confusion and separation from others that make up their—and our—recent experience of pandemic, economic loss, and the seeming breakdown of dreams and hopes.

It seems incredibly apt that a show based on the gospel we use for our Sunday readings this particular year should be produced reflecting our context this particular year. But that is only to be expected from the Gospel...the Good News of Jesus. As those who regularly wrestle with scripture know, the Gospel is always fresh, always

speaking to our own time, sometimes in comfort and reassurance, and sometimes in ways that are uncomfortable, difficult, or even painful. Every encounter with God's word brings new discoveries, new hopes and new insights. As we enter in to the final weeks of this year's St. Matthew Gospel cycle, I invite you, as the collect says, to "read, mark, learn and inwardly digest" how the Good News speaks in this time and place.

One of my favorite pieces based on Psalm 137 from the 1973 *Godspell* original cast album seems appropriate as we continue to discern how we are to be Good News for the world in this time and context.

On the willows, there
We hung up our lyres
For our captors there
Required of us songs
And our tormentors, mirth

Saying, Sing us one
Of the songs of Zion
Sing us one
Of the songs of Zion

But how can we sing? Sing the Lord's songs? In a foreign land?



Scheduling Meetings in the Church

If you are planning on scheduling an event at church, make sure to contact the Parish Office to make sure you are not double booking.

hen scheduling an event at church make sure that it is limited to the proper number of people inside (15) or outside (25) and to only one hour. If the meeting is fewer than six people you may meet in the parlor or parish center with the windows opened and the 6-foot distance between the attendees can be maintained. Otherwise you must met in the undercroft. As a reminder, it is required that



you keep a contact list of everyone who attended, and make sure that every high touched surfaces are sanitized and sprayed after the meeting.
