# GRACE NOTES—April 2021



### Mother Cathy's Corner

Each congregation of the Episcopal Church prepares an annual Parochial Report as required by Canon I.6.1. The principle purpose of the Parochial Report is " to secure an accurate view of the state of the Episcopal Church," and is the joint responsibility of clergy and vestry. It is not merely a report for assessment ("tax") purposes, rather, it is a way for the church, diocese, and congregation to enable effective mission and effective evaluation of our efforts.

Obviously the metrics used on the Parochial Report were never designed for a year like 2020. For instance, how does one count "Average Sunday Attendance" when we are deliberately not gathering? How do we account for significant differences between congregations and state pandemic stay-home orders? Or between the technical capabilities of different parishes and their members?

A special 2020 Parochial Report was developed, which included specific questions about the impact of the pandemic on worship, formation for children, youth and adults; the impact on the financial condition of the congregation, and whether the parish intends to continue livestreaming (i.e., Zoom, Facebook Live, YouTube etc.) once restrictions are lifted. For the most part, Grace's vestry felt the impact was, "somewhat significant" in terms of attendance and on our financial circumstances.

This year the report also contained questions about the congregation's, vestry's and clergy's commitment to racial justice and reconciliation, and three narrative questions to be answered by the vestry:

- 1. What were the primary opportunities, innovations and challenges in conducting worship during the pandemic? What did you learn?
- 2. What are the primary opportunities and challenges your church is facing as it plans for the

future?

3. What three things have changed the most in how the church conducts its ministry?

At a meeting for the purpose, the vestry had a very thoughtful discussion of the questions. Our commitment as a congregation, and as a vestry to working toward racial justice and reconciliation was determined to be "neutral". The narrative questions were more open-ended. Of course discussion of challenges received a lot of attention, particularly the diocesan limits on gathering, which some felt to be too rigorous and imposed. There were also some significant opportunities and innovations noted, particularly the opportunity for both elders and parents of young children to "do church" without having to leave home. Also noted was the interesting dynamic in which a Zoom meeting from home can sometimes feel more intimate and comfortable than the same meeting in-person, facilitating conversation with those one isn't as familiar with. Some responses were mixed, e.g., We'd rather be in church AND we need to continue doing live streaming. Particularly changed during the pandemic, and greatly missed, has been the lack of social opportunities, and especially funerals and receptions.

Although we must still be careful for the sake of our neighbors, as restrictions gradually ease, and more people are vaccinated and feel comfortable assembling, we can consider similar questions to these. What have we learned? Where do you see opportunities? How has your ministry changed?

## MARCH VESTRY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- •It was noted that the increased water/sewer bill for February was the result of an overlooked toilet running for quite a while.
- •Vestry approved the Memorial Committee's recommendation to fund the pur chase from memorial funds of a Shur MVI Audio Interface and cable from DCI sound to provide better sound for live streaming.
- •Our Treasurer's job description will be completed next month.

- •Grace Vestry Guidepost received a recommendation to appoint a timekeeper, so to keep discussions in reasonable timeframes. Agendas will be collaborative preparations between wardens and rector.
- •Emma Wolf will maintain the church lawns for \$50/mow, plus gas reimbursement.
- •Allen Wolf is willing to help with the Chicken BBQ, but is unable to chair it. A CBBQ meeting is tentatively scheduled for April 14 @ 7:00 PM. All are invited.


