Mother Cathy's Corner

"We who are many are one body, because we all share one bread, one cup."



Since the Reformation in the sixteenth century, Anglicans, whether lay or ordained, have received Holy Communion in the form of both Bread and Wine. The common cup is a hallmark of Anglican/Episcopal practice. Our Book of Common Prayer, on page 407 states,

Opportunity is always to be given to every communicant to receive the consecrated Bread and Wine separately. But the Sacrament may be received in both kinds simultaneously, in a manner approved by the bishop.

Our practice, as Episcopalians, has been to use a *common* cup; that is, not small individual communion cups often seen in Protestant churches, nor a single cup used only by the priest, as in Roman Catholic churches, but one or more large cups – chalices – from which communicants drink. The unity implied by the symbol of one (and only one) chalice on the altar is key, and is reinforced by the rubric, also on page 407,

During the Great Thanksgiving, it is appropriate that there be only one chalice on the Altar, and, if need be, a flagon of wine from which additional chalices may be filled after the Breaking of the Bread.

Because of this Anglican emphasis on the common cup and weekly celebration of the Holy Eucharist, the practices necessary to reduce possible exposure to the coronavirus that causes COVID-19 came as a great blow. There was great grief over the loss of in-person worship, access to Holy Communion, and the changes in practices required to maintain health and safety, particularly for those at greatest risk. Fortunately, effective vaccines have been developed, and the most recent research shows that airborne transmission of the virus is far likelier than transmission by touch, or by drinking from a common cup.

Studies during other outbreaks, including the 2009-2010 H1N1 "swine" flu pandemic, show that using a silver or gold (plated) chalice, fortified wine with a higher alcohol content (e.g. port), and good technique when administering the chalice, (i.e.,thoroughly wiping both the inside and outside rim with a clean cloth) reduces the rate of infection to almost zero for otherwise healthy persons, especially when celebrant and Eucharistic ministers are scrupulous about hand-washing and use of sanitizer.

Beginning September 11th, we will resume distributing Communion in both kinds at all services.

The Eucharistic Minister with the chalice will be positioned at a distance from the celebrant. You will receive the Bread, then, if you wish, you may

- 1.) received the Wine by drinking from the chalice or
- 2.) having received the Bread on the flat of your palm, you may present it to the Eucharistic Minister who will instinct (dip) it into the Wine and return it to you, either in your hand or on your tongue*.

You may also choose not to receive the Wine. Since ancient times it has been understood that Communion in one kind only is still complete reception of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus.

*Intincting (dipping) for yourself is <u>not</u> permitted at this time, as it greatly increases the number of unsanitized fingers which may accidentally touch the Wine. Hands are far more likely to transmit microbes than a careful sip followed by effective wiping.

August Vestry Meeting Highlights

- Treasurer Dave Ferrari noted that everything is set with the auditor, who needs to meet on site prior to September 1. Diocese to be contacted regarding timing.
- Foundation sidewalk grant received and deposited. Check will be issued on demand.
- Letters regarding vestry qualifications and nominations will be generated to all congregants.
- COVID regulations reflect CDC guidelines. We're good now, but things can change. Masks are optional, but when Head Start begins (9/8) masks will be required in common areas during school hours (could change).
- Ministry Mash-Up 2.0 kickoff will be September 11, following the brick ceremony. Envelopes with instructions and materials will be dispersed then. Campaign will run for a month, with weekly reminders.
- Thank you notes were written to Ron Jackson and Bernie and Mark Ende for their generous donations of a laptop and TV screen and for two air conditioners.
- Pledge envelopes will only be given on demand.
- Vestry will solicit snowplowing bid from current provider if price is agreed upon.
- Brick Sunday is September 11. The common cup will be restored to use at the 9AM service. Only the Eucharistic Minister can intinct.
- Lewis scholarships have been extended to Connor Hamilton (Renewal) and Jenna Reese (New)

Current COVID-19 Precautions

The Vestry has determined that, going forward, we will calibrate our precautions to the level of transmission reported by the CDC, and to their recommendations. In the CDC's system, counties are assigned a weekly status of green, yellow or red, depending on rates of transmission. Therefore, we will increase or decrease the ventilation, recommend or require masks and physical distancing, and other measures depending on the current status of Onondaga County.

At the time of publication, the Head Start program will again require universal masking, therefore we will still require universal masking in common areas Monday through Friday during school hours until arrival at your destination. This requirement could change, and any changes will be reported in This Week at Grace and on our website.

Place the yellow dots on ministries you can participate in.




