### Mother Cathy's Corner

What would you do if you won a big prize? A prize in the tens of thousands or so. Would you spend it all on the trip of a lifetime? Split it with your relatives? Pay off your mortgage or car loan? Set up funds for your young relatives' post high school education?

One of my seminary classmates, David Sibley, now an Episcopal priest in the state of Washington, just had a three-day win-

ning streak on *Jeopardy!* and won \$79,000. On Twitter he's said his family will tithe his winnings - that's 10% - to the church he serves. The vestry will decide what to do with the money, and he will abstain from the discussion.

David and his wife have a young child, and he's also said that providing for her college education is a priority. By the time their daughter is ready to go to college, the cost for a private college is likely to exceed \$100,000 per year (there are schools where it costs that much already!). So why is he tithing his winnings to the parish? Ten percent off the top? He says, "It's an act of trust in what God has done, what God will do, and a way for me to grow spiritually through that trust".

This might seem rather admirable, but perhaps it's only for those individuals who are spiritual heavyweights. Most of us would do no such thing. We might think the best and most prudent thing to do is to secure the future for ourselves or our loved ones. (And maybe treat ourselves, just a little bit).

In the parables of Jesus, over and over again we find people who are just not very good at asset management. The shepherd who leaves 99 sheep at risk in order to chase after one that is lost. The woman who loses a coin and when she finds it, throws a party for the neighbors (that must have cost something!). Then there's the cautionary tale of the man who had so much grain that he wanted to tear down his barns in order to build bigger ones - but he died before he could do that.

We also hear about the time a kid had a couple of fish and five rounds of pita to share, and Jesus said the blessing and amazingly, there was enough for thousands of people, with 12 baskets of leftovers.

If we close our hands to hang on tightly to what we already have (99 sheep, 9 coins, piles and piles of grain, etc.), how can we open our hands (and our hearts) to trust God?

# **Current COVID-19 Precautions**

The Vestry has determined that, going forward, we will calibrate our precautions to the level of transmission reported by the CDC, and to their recommendations. In the CDC's system, counties are assigned a weekly status of green, yellow or red, depending on rates of transmission. Therefore, we will increase or decrease the ventilation, recommend or require masks and physical distancing, and other measures depending on the current status of Onondaga County.

At the time of publication, the Head Start program will again require universal masking, therefore we will still require universal masking in common areas Monday through Friday during school hours until arrival at your destination. This requirement could change, and any changes will be reported in This Week at Grace and on our website.

#### Tomato Sorbet


- 2 oz. sugar

- $\Rightarrow$  Postage stamps


